Doctor of Philosophy in Educational Management COURSE DESCRIPTION

3 units

BASIC COURSES

PhDPHILO Philosophy of Human Person

The study of essential human characteristics—traits that distinguish humans from other living things and shape who they are—is known as the philosophy of the human person. These characteristics include human intelligence, freedom, and individuality. This course would also look at its logical implications for the existence of the soul and the possibility of life after death. The distinction between humans and animals, as well as the transcendent aspects of the human soul, will be the course's main themes. This would be an avenue to introduce the philosophy and improve students' reading, analysis, and reasoning skills, as well as to foster student respect for facts, evidence, and arguments, towards fostering an appreciation for opposing points of view and those who hold them.

PhDEM 300 Philosophy and Practice of Educational Leadership 3 units

This interdisciplinary course lays the groundwork for the development of personal and professional leadership styles that are grounded in the evolution of leadership theory while also taking into account the impact of social locations and identities. Following exposure to recognized leaders in education and other fields, the students, through this course, are expected to be able to hypothesize which leadership principles resonate with their area of work and study. Students will perform interdisciplinary analyses of leadership theories and philosophies, as well as research the complex ethical and professional responsibilities that exist within professional and community relationships.

PhDRESEM Advanced Research in Educational Management 3 units

This course is designed to prepare the doctorate degree programs for writing their dissertation. Specifically, the methods, including those under qualitative and quantitative and its combination, applicable for a higher, deeper, and wider scope of explorations would be discussed in this course. Preparation and provision of in-depth analysis for the selected topics for the dissertation in the respective field of specialization is at the core of the course. Lastly, formulation of the appropriate frameworks/paradigms, research questions, and research design for the PhD level is expected alongside the working title.

MAJOR COURSES

PhDEM 301 Supervision of Instruction and Curriculum Enhancement 3 units

This course examines and analyzes the nature, scope, purpose, historical development, patterns, functions, process, methods, techniques, and evaluation of the supervision of instruction. Its focus is on the role process, theory and practice, and issues in the curricular improvement and instructional supervision that provide students a deeper understanding of instructional supervision through conscious reflection, analysis, and evaluation of their professional practice to learn and change and more

importantly to structure and appraise their own behaviors and instruments for curriculum and instructional improvement.

PhDEM 302 Managing Employees and Professionals 3 units

This course focuses on the supervision, evaluations, and professional development of personnel and administrators. The topics for study will include preparation, certification, selection, assignment, and promotion of teachers' performance appraisal and professional growth, tenure, academic freedom, membership in professional organizations, and the Code of Ethics for Professional Teachers including their rights and responsibilities.

PhDEM 303 Leadership and Management in Educational Institutions 3 units

The course is designed to provide educational leaders with a solid foundation grounded on research, theory, and interdisciplinary approaches, allowing them to develop their own principles and theories that can serve as consistent guidelines for their management actions. The course focuses on strategic planning and management concepts, as well as their educational applications. Students are expected to have acquired the knowledge and skills required to develop strategic plans for educational institutions.

PhDEM 304 Contemporary and Emerging Theories, Models and 3 units Practices in Educational Leadership

This course exposes the students to new, emerging, and research-based theories and models that may find a significant place and use in leading and managing educational institutions. It provides students the opportunity to get involved in an in-depth and reflective study and analysis of both the theoretical and conceptual bases of these theories and models, and determine their possible application to the management and leadership of educational institutions and other related organizations. In this course, the students are expected to come up with output relative to leadership and management practices with reference to certain theories and models. Students will also gain a thorough understanding of the various issues and concerns concerning the organization, management, and administration of educational technology in a learning environment, as well as be exposed to various types of information and communication technologies and their instructional applications.

PhDEM 305 Organizational Transformation in Global 3 units Educational Institutions

This integrating course allows students to examine global trends and their implications for educational development. Students are expected to create a plan for the organizational transformation of an educational institution or educational system.

ELECTIVE COURSES

PhDMANCOM Management Communication

3 units

This course is designed to introduce students to the theories, principles, and practices of public relations as the management of communication between an organization and the public. It also intends to

help students think strategically about communication and aid them in improving their writing, presentation, and interpersonal communication skills as future managers.

PhDRESCOLL Research Colloquium and 3 units Seminar in Research Publication

This course shall enable the graduate students to make structured and periodic progress on their research papers and comply with PhD in Educational Management program requirements. It enables them as well to complete and finish the research paper in time for formal research presentation and even in journal publication.

INSTITUTIONAL COURSE REQUIREMENT PhDJANSSEN Janssen's Spirituality II

(3 units)

The course is a CHED-approved institutional course provided particularly for students doing graduate courses at the Divine Word College of Calapan. The Janssen Spirituality course for PhD students, which covers the second and final of two parts, will explain innovative themes related to the life and mission of St. Arnold Janssen and the Society of the Divine Word (SVD) today. This innovation will expand and deepen the themes to develop the spiritual leadership skills of the student within the wider context of the complexities of his/her profession and advocacy.

DISSERTATION WRITING

PhDDW1 **Dissertation Writing Proposal**

This course is designed for advanced doctoral students who want to improve their research skills beyond what they learned in methods classes. This course's goal is to get advanced doctoral students started on their dissertation proposal writing and to become competent in basic research designs, which includes making decisions about matching research designs to specific research problems. Furthermore, students will gain a better understanding of the issues to consider when deciding on the overall evaluation of their research. Students will learn how to develop literature for their research topic as well as potential methodological approaches. The emphasis during doctoral training will be on how to construct a research question that can be empirically addressed. While the primary focus of this course is on dissertation proposal writing, it also refreshes doctoral students on basic research concepts such as conducting literature reviews, understanding theory, defining research problems and methods, collecting and analyzing data, communicating findings, and applying research to solve educational problems.
